FR. Joseph's Corner...

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) Part – 3

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF THE CHURCH IN THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION:

God's grace, mercy and forgiveness comes to us through Christ and his church. In all our prayer we pray and end the prayer saying 'this we ask through Christ Our Lord'.

He has bought us this grace with his blood. The church not only calls us to humble repentance but also intercedes for us and helps us toward ongoing conversion.

THREE PARTS OF SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION:

- Contrition feeling sorry for what you have done
- 2. Confession The acknowledgement of your sins and saying it to the priest.
- 3. Penance Penance for one's own good.

First of all we should feel the urge or need to go for confession once we commit a sin.

EXAMPLE: In the movie THE PASSION OF CHRIST after Peter denies Jesus three times he goes to Mary to confess his sins. On the part of Peter the more he loved Jesus the more he felt sorry for what he had done. The difference between Peter and Judas is that though both of them betrayed Jesus Peter looked towards God for lover and mercy and Jesus responded making him the shepherd of

his flock. He was saved, but, Judas looked into himself with guilt and shame and he hanged himself. Perhaps he did not seek God's forgiveness and mercy and love.

So, we understand that sin is a reality and it does exist as St Paul says, "sin lives in me" (Rom 7:17). What is our attitude towards it? Today worst things are happening. We have lost the sense of sin by which we go away from the love of the Lord. Today not many go for confession including priests, religious and clergy. Have we lost the relevance of it? We need to examine. The one who seeks God's mercy and forgiveness God comes into him like Peter's experience and St Paul's experience. Those who neglect or seek salvation within themselves are like Judas who feel guilt and shame and live a life of tragedy.

Today people say lies, loot others, kill others, disregard others.....there is so much greed, hatred, pride, fundamentalism, injustice, raping, abducting, marginalization, caste feeling, bribery, corruption, torture....you can go on naming the vice of this world. All these have become part and parcel of life. They are not seen as sins anymore. The conscience of the people are dead. The power of sin is such that it paralyses our character and if we give into it, it can even change our

Advent –a new beginning

The presence of the Advent Candles emphasizes the positive over the negative. St. Paul in a reading we share during Mass today encourages us out-right to cast off deeds of darkness, and put on the armor of light. This light is accentuated by candles, which in our liturgy are very prominent. From the Paschal candle, to the candles on the altar, those carried by altar-servers, those votive ones lit by parishioners as a form of prayer, candles emphasize light over darkness. And remember that it's better to light one candle than to curse the darkness. And also you don't have to blow someone's candle out to make yours look brighter. The custom of the Advent candles goes back to the Scandinavian countries that have very long winters, with very little sunshine. So farmers bring in their farm carts, and some of them started to decorate them with bows and greens, and eventually candles. The church took the idea and developed the Advent Wreath with 4 candles with a particular theme for each Sunday: Watch, Stay Awake, on the first Sunday, Prepare the way of the Lord next week, Rejoice on the third Sunday, using the rose-colored vestments, and **Behold** for the Sunday before Christmas. Some churches even add a white one for Christmas and the theme Celebrate. This year, let's make it a point to really try hard to MAKE ROOM FOR JESUS in our hearts. To make room for Him. we have to get rid of all the stuff that's been taking his place. This requires a little bit of an inventory of our hearts and lives. So may we look at enemies and see the possibility of friendship..., May we look at fevered buying and see hope for simple generosity.... May we look at family tensions and see opportunities for reconciliation..., May we look at pessimism towards the future and see positive optimism..., May we look at stumbling blocks and see instead stepping stones..., May we look at alleys and valleys of darkness and see instead Highways and byways of bright possibilities..., May we look at tragedy and misfortune and see the hope of change, growth, and a new beginning.., May we look at discouragement and see a determined and courageous approach to a

hopeful future...



First Sunday of Advent



1st R. – Isa.63:16b-17, 19b; 64:2-7 Res. Ps – 80:2-3, 15-16 18-19 2nd R – 1Cor.1:3-9 Gospel Accl – Mar.11:9, 10 Gospel – Mar.13:33-37

The central theme of today's readings is Jesus' warning to us to be alert, watchful and prepared because Christ's **Second Coming**, coinciding with the end of the world, can occur at any time. People, in general, used to have a paranoid fear about the end of the world. They expected it in A.D. 204, 999 and 2000. The title of a best-seller published in 1988 was 101 Reasons Why Christ Returns in 1988. A very popular film released in 1999 about Christ's Second Coming was Omega Code, and another film released in 2005 was Left Behind. Excessive fear of the tribulations accompanying the end of the world led the followers of a religious cult led by Jim Jones (in 1978), and followers of another cult

called *Heaven's Gate* (in 1997), to commit mass suicide.

In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah prays for God's active presence so that the Jewish community, returned from Babylonian exile, may remain faithful to their God. In the second reading, St. Paul prays for the reconversion of Christians in Corinth who have misused their gifts and charisms and remain ill-prepared for Christ's Second Coming.

But Jesus, in today's Gospel, gives us the assurance that we need not be afraid of the end of the world, Christ's Second Coming and the Last Judgment if we remain alert and prepared. The Church invites us on this first Sunday of Advent to prepare for Christ's Second Coming, first by properly celebrating during this Christmas season the fond memory of Christ's first coming 2000 years ago, second, by experiencing Christ's daily advent or coming in the Eucharistic celebrations, in the Holy Bible and in the worshipping community, and third, by preparing for Jesus' Second Coming which, for us, will happen at the moment of our deaths or at the end of the World.

In today's Gospel, using the short parable of the servants and gate-keeper of an absentee master who could return at any time, Jesus instructs his followers to be alert and watchful while doing their Christian duties with sincerity. The gate-keeper and the household servants are expected to be ever-vigilant because their master is sure to return. The time of his return is

uncertain, but the reward or punishment is sure and certain.

Today's Gospel is the conclusion of a speech found in Mark 13, in which Jesus foretells his Second Coming (Parousia), at the end of time or at the end of the world. Ten years after Paul's death, Mark reminded his community in Rome of Jesus' words, "Be constantly on the watch! Stay awake! You do not know when the appointed time will come." The evangelist knew that if an expected event didn't happen as quickly as expected, people would stop doing the things they ought to do. Hence, Mark reminded them of Jesus' parable about the gate-keeper in the house of a traveling master. Since the master was traveling, his servant must be constantly alert, "at dusk, at midnight, when the cock crows, or at early dawn." There was always a fear that the master would come home "suddenly and catch you asleep." In such situations one must constantly, "be on guard!" When Paul and Mark spoke about the things to come, it was only to remind their readers that their present behavior wasn't measuring up to what Christ's second coming demanded.

An Advent project for remaining alert and watchful in the spirit of today's Gospel. Every morning when we get up, let us pray, "Lord, show me someone today with whom I may share your love, mercy and forgiveness." Mother Teresa of Calcutta once said, "Whatever you do in

your family, for your children, for your husband, for your wife, you do for Jesus." Every night when we go to bed, let us ask ourselves, "Where have I found Christ today?" The answer will be God's Advent gift to us that day. By being alert and watchful we will receive an extra gift: Christ himself. Let us remember the saying of St. Thomas Aquinas: "Without God, I can't. Without me, He won't."

We need to be wakeful and watchful: We are so future-oriented that we often forget the present entirely. We spend too much time trying to protect ourselves against future misfortunes. We save for a rainy day, to get married, to buy a home, to send the children to college, to retire in comfort and to protect ourselves against future misfortunes. But we need to be more spiritually wakeful and prepare for our eternal life because we can die any day, and that is the end of the world for us. Let this Advent season be the time of such a preparation for us.
