Fr. Joseph's Corner.... Advent – a new beginning

The presence of the Advent Candles emphasizes the positive over the negative. St Paul in a reading we share during Mass today encourages us outrightly to cast off deeds of darkness, and put on the armor of light. This light is accentuated by candles, which in our liturgy are very prominent. From the Paschal candle, to the candles on the altar, those carried by altar-servers, those votive ones lit by parishioners as a form of prayer, candles emphasize light over darkness. And remember that it's better to lo light one candle than to curse the darkness. And also you don't have to blow someone's candle out to make yours look brighter.

The custom of the Advent candles goes back to the Scandinavian countries that have very long winters, with very little sunshine. So farmers bring in their farm carts, and some of them started to decorate them with bows and greens, and eventually candles. The church took the idea and developed the Advent Wreath with 4 candles with a particular theme for each Sunday: Watch, Stay Awake, on the first Sunday, **Prepare the** way of the Lord next week, **Rejoice** on the third Sunday, using the rose-colored vestments, and **Behold** for the Sunday before Christmas, Some churches even add a white one for Christmas and the theme **Celebrate**.

This year, let's make it a point to really try hard to MAKE ROOM FOR **JESUS** in our hearts. To make room for Him, we have to get rid of all the stuff that's been taking his place. This requires a little bit of an inventory of our hearts and lives. So may we look at enemies and see the possibility of friendship . . . May we look at fevered buying and see hope for simple generosity May we look at family tensions and see opportunities for reconciliation May we look at pessimism towards the future and see positive optimism May we look at stumbling blocks and see instead stepping stones May we look at alleys and valleys of darkness and see instead Highways and byways of bright possibilities ... May we look at tragedy and misfortune and see the hope of change, growth and a new beginning May we look at discouragement and see a determined and courageous approach to a hopeful future.

Our Lord Jesus Christ King of the Universe

November 25, 2018

1st R. Dan. 7:13-14 Res. Ps – 93:1, 1-2, 5 2nd R – Rev.1:5-8 Gospel Accl – Mark 11:9, 10 Gospel – John 18:33b-37

Christ the King

It was Pope Pius XI who brought the Feast of Christ the King into the liturgy in 1925 in order to bring Christ, his rule and Christian values back into lives of Christians, into society and into politics. The Feast was also a reminder to the totalitarian governments of Mussolini, Hitler and Stalin that Jesus Christ is the only Sovereign King. Although Emperors and Kings now exist mostly in history books, we still honor Christ as the King of the Universe by enthroning Him in our hearts and allowing Him to take control of our lives. This feast challenges us to see Christ the King in everyone, especially those whom our society considers the least important, and to treat each person with love, mercy and compassion as Jesus did.

The New Testament tells us that Jesus is the long-awaited King of the Jews. In the Annunciation, recorded in Lk 1:32-33, we read: "The Lord God will make him a King, as his ancestor David was, and he will be the King of the descendants of Jacob forever and His Kingdom will never end." When Pilate asked the question: (Jn 18:33) "Are you the King of the Jews"? Jesus made this answer, "You say I am a King. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to My Voice" (Jn 18:37)

We need to surrender our lives to Christ's rule: Since Christ, our King, lives in our hearts with the Holy Spirit and His Heavenly Father and fills our souls with His grace, we need to learn to live in His Holy Presence, doing His will by sharing His forgiving love with others around us. We need to be constantly aware of His Presence in the Bible, in the Sacraments and in the worshipping community.

We need to fight against the enemies of Christ's Kingdom: Terrorism has affected the entire world, including Christ's kingdom on earth. These terrorists are people who slaughter the unborn; engage in a frontal attack on the modern family through provocative television shows, music movies, and pornography; eradicate any recognition of God from public display and public schools; they include those priests and religious who abuse children. Hence, Jesus, the King,

needs convinced apostles prepared and ready to fight against these enemies, first by prayer, then by accepting willingly the sufferings that come our way and offering them to God with Jesus, our King, in reparation for our sins and the sins of the world, and finally by living lives of loving humble service, using our gifts generously for all. The battlefield is the home, the school, the place of employment, the neighborhood, and the parish. These provide new and exciting challenges, new opportunities for us to do, ourselves, what is right and to live out the Truth of Jesus Christ our King, neither compromising with sin nor passing judgment on the motives or guilt of any of our brothers and sisters, but loving and praying for all of us. To ensure that Jesus is always the King of our hearts, we need to make a great commitment to Him and to back that commitment with the necessary sacrifices, conviction, hard work and daily, serious prayer.

We need to use what authority we have been given to pass on Jesus' message. This feast is an invitation to all those who have power or authority in the government, public offices, educational institutions and in the family to use it for Jesus. Are we using our God-given authority so as to serve others with love and compassion as Jesus did? Are we using it to build a

more just society rather than to boost our own egos? Are parents using their God-given authority to train their children in Christian ideals and committed Christian living?

We need to make Christ the King of our Personallife: By allowing Him to be King and center of our heart through prayer, receiving the Sacraments and freely entering a personal relationship with Him

The Solemnity of Christ the King is not just the conclusion of the Church year. It is also a summary of our lives as Christians. On this great Feast, let us resolve to give Christ the central place in our lives and to obey His commandment of love by sharing our blessings with all his needy children. Let us conclude the Church year by asking the Lord to help us serve the King of Kings as He presents Himself in those reaching out to us. "To Him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by His Blood and made us a Kingdom, priests for His God and Father, to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen" (Revelation 1:5b-6). Christ conquers! Christ rules! Christ reigns!
