FR. Joseph's Corner...

The Eucharist: Part 1

The Origin of the Eucharistic Celebration:

The Jews thanked God for two blessings; namely, the gift of time and the gift of riches. They thanked God for His gift of time by observing the last day of the week as Sabbath—a day of rest, worship, and good works. They thanked God for the gift of riches by offering tithes to the Temple. The early Christians did the same, observing Sunday for their day of rest and thanksgiving, by participating in the "Lord's Supper," and returning thanks for all God had given them by sharing what they had with the less fortunate in their Faith community.

The Eucharistic Celebration has its roots in the ancient Jewish Passover Meal, Passover was celebrated both as a memorial feast and a thanksgiving meal commemorating the liberation of the Chosen People from their slavery in Egypt. It was at such a Passover (the Last Supper, as we call it), that Jesus instituted the Eucharist. The three synoptic Gospels and St. Paul have handed on to us the account of the institution of the Eucharist at this Last Supper. By celebrating this meal with His apostles, Jesus gave the Jewish Passover its definitive meaning: His passage to the Father by death and Resurrection. Jesus followed the ancient tradition of blessing the bread and wine. Then He gave a whole new meaning to the Passover feast when He "took bread, blessed it, and gave it to the disciples and said, 'Take, eat; this is My Body'" (Matthew 26:26). After this, He took a cup of wine, gave thanks, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "This cup which is poured out for you is the New Covenant of My Blood" (Luke

22:20). Thus, the Last Supper was both a farewell meal and a sacrifice. Jesus, Himself, was the Sacrifice as well as the Priest because He offered His Body and Blood to God in sacrifice for all people.

Jesus's Command and Its Practice in the Church: The command of Jesus ("Do this in memory of Me"), obliges us to repeat his actions and words "until he comes." It also directs His apostles and their successors to carry out a liturgical celebration of His life, death, Resurrection, and intercession [CCC #165]. From the beginning, the Church has been faithful to the Lord's command. It was on "the first day of the week," or Sunday, the day of Jesus's Resurrection, that the Christians met "to break bread."

Of the early Church in Jerusalem, it is written in the Acts: "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and prayers . . . Day by day, attending the Temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they partook of food with glad and generous hearts."

As early as the 2nd Century, we have the witness of St. Justin, martyr, regarding the basic order of the Eucharistic Celebration. Around 155 AD, St. Justin wrote to the pagan emperor, Antonius Pius, explaining to him the meaning of the Christian Eucharistic Celebration. Down through the centuries, the Church has been careful to preserve the basic structure of the Mass in all liturgical families—both in the East and in the West. (To be continued next week.)

Discipleship: Profit or Loss? By Fr. Richard R De Lillio

As a young girl, Tara was taught to respect people older than herself — "Even when you differ," instructed her mother. Tara always did just that. Now, Mr. Mooney, her elderly neighbor, had a bad temper. When Tara and her friends became too noisy playing, Mr. Mooney yelled and chased them away. No one liked him. After his stroke, Mr. Mooney had trouble walking. When his

morning paper didn't make his front porch, Tara carefully and quickly placed it there. He never thanked her, and sometimes he chased her away. But Tara retrieved his newspaper anyway. When her playmates asked why she did this, she answered, "Because my mom said it's the right thing to do." Tara learned a life lesson: Do what you're told even when it's troubling. This week, Jesus teaches a similar lesson to his followers.

Every once in a while, Jesus wanted to make certain that he and his disciples were reading the same signs of the times. Jesus shares that things are not looking good. Jesus' enemies are now beginning to come together with one purpose. They want to kill Jesus. He doesn't observe the Sabbath, and he

calls God his father. Jesus has to be taught a lesson.

The incredible reality behind all this is that Jesus realizes and understands what all this means. He knows exactly what the chief priests, the elders and the scribes intend to do to him. Jesus is going to Jerusalem, despite what lies ahead. He will do his Father's will, no matter the consequences. This is the same crucial life. lesson Tara learned but on a smaller scale: faithfulness always, whether good or bad times. Jesus asks for trust and faithfulness. He wants his disciples to stand firm, for he knows what they, too, will face in the future.

As Jeremiah learned, Tara bravely did and Paul exhorted to his followers: Faithfulness, and not circumstances, determines our choices. Even when other voices like Peter's tried to pull him in a different direction, Jesus was as quick and firm as he was before: "Get behind me, Satan!"

Jesus wants his disciples to think as God does. Peter and all the apostles certainly got the message.

Jesus teaches them clearly and simply that embracing the heinous cross will gain life, while denying the cross will lose their lives. It may seem folly, but it is truly profit, for gain comes when they forfeit their lives for another. Jesus is prepared to show them this in Jerusalem.

Discipleship includes the cross, death on that cross and resurrection as part of the complete package. They can never avoid the cross. Jesus did not, and neither can they. Jesus is going to Jerusalem, and we are bound to do the same.
