Today's Homily

18TH SUNDAY IN

ORDINARY TIME

IN LAST SUNDAY'S Gospel, Jesus fed a crowd of more than five thousand, and now much of that crowd has followed Him to Capernaum in the hope that He would perform another "sign."

Jesus does understand their hunger, but He knows it is not a spiritual one. They clearly haven't understood the true significance of what He did with those simple

loaves and fishes. In an attempt to refocus their minds, Jesus tells them, Do not work for that which perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life.

Jesus knew that they were looking for more food, that they were hungry. But in today's gospel passage, Jesus is talking about another kind of hunger, the kind that affects or can affect all of us human beings. That hunger is spiritual-the kind that no physical food can satisfy. Only Jesus can begin to satisfy it, whatever its origins, whatever its symptoms or signs.

Sometimes it is a hunger for truth, and in Jesus we find truth. He himself declared: "I am the way and the truth and the life." Sometimes it is a hunger for life and, in Jesus alone, we find life. Again, we have His solemn promise: "I have come that you may have life and have it abundantly." Sometimes it is a hunger for love and, in Jesus, we discover the kind of love that outlasts and conquers sin and death. Our hungry hearts will find satisfaction and rest only in Jesus.

But back to the Gospel story. Note that after Jesus chided the Jews for looking only for food that perishes they had a question for him: "What can we do to accomplish the works of God?"

I wonder if they expected Jesus to lay down a list of things for them to do-actions they were to perform.

Wednesday, August 4th, is the Memorial of St. John Vianney, Priest: Jean-Marie Vianney was born into a peasant family in Dardilly, France, in 1786. With difficulty he reached the ordination of priest at age 32 and, in 1818, he was appointed parish priest of Ars-en-Dombes, a remote town that had lapsed in its faith, which he brought back to the Church using only prayer, mortification, and example. The town became a pilgrimage site, where the "holy curate" heard Confessions for long hours each day. He died in 1859.

But that was not what

cording to Jesus, the one work that God desires of us is faith. And what does having faith mean here? I think it means, first of all, that we seek to have with

God a kind of relationship and realization that we are His children, and that He is our father. We should realize that we need not be terrified of Him anymore, but rather, we can trust Him, knowing that He wants us to try to repay His love for us with our own deep love for Him.

And if we have failed Him in any way, we must also realize that God wants nothing more than to forgive the repentant sinner and to give him or her a new direction in life.

Jesus is not only willing to help us-He has promised to help us. He does this by giving us Himself. His help comes to us in the form of bread-bread which gives life-the true bread that comes down from heaven as He did.

Of course, this heavenly bread is the Holy Eucharist or Holy Communion as we call it, from which we draw courage and power, resolve and strength and, above all, the grace to persevere until the end of our life here on earth and the beginning of eternal bliss in heaven.

The Eucharist we celebrate today seeks to nourish our hearts and feed our souls. No matter what our response, God's unfailing love and abundant care are ever present if we are only ready to accept them. For to accomplish the works of God is to believe in the One He sent.

Friday, August 6th, is the Feast of The Transfiguration of the Lord: The evangelical episode narrated by Matthew, Mark, and Luke presents the vision of the glory of Christ, transfigured atop a high mountain (identified as Mt. Tabor), where He had gone to pray with Peter, John, and James. Jesus appeared with a luminous face like the sun-his clothes white and shining-in dialog with Moses and Elijah. The glorious manifestation was confirmed by the words of God, speaking from the sky: "This is My beloved Son-hear Him."

St. Joseph's Parish: Decade of the '90s

Bishop Thomas Connolly continued as our Bishop all through the nineties. Fr. Robert Simard (Fr. Bob) continued as our Pastor until May of 1999.

In early 1991, a patio was built on the east side of the Rectory.

In 1992-after much study to provide adequate support-the wooden beams in the church basement were replaced with steel posts. The following year, the hallway of the Parish Hall was remodeled, including a handicapped accessible restroom, altering the arrangement of doors. Electrical outlets were also added in the classrooms, the parking lot was overlaid, and the interior of the Parish Hall was painted.

Then in 1996, the parish celebrated Fr. Bob's 40th Anniversary of his Ordination as a Priest, and in May of 1999, he resigned due to his health. (Fr. Bob had been fighting a brain tumor, which



the doctors attempted to remove surgically in 1997.)

Fr. Bob moved into the Dreher House after his retirement on the corner of First and Court Streets. One of the skills that he had brought with him was a proclamation of the Gospel from memory!

We were then blessed to have Fr. George Nazareth transfer from Hermiston. Fr. George was from the Diocese of Goa in India where he was a longtime rector of the seminary. He spoke English, Spanish, Portuguese, and his native dialect.

In 1996, the interior of the Church was remodeled, and the Bishop came and blessed the work. And in 1999, Kathie Leonard was hired as the Parish Secretary.
