




St. Vincent de Paul (L)

Today's Homily

AT THE SCREENING of the film Mother Teresa during the celebration of the fortieth anniversary of the United Nations in 1983, the Secretary General, Javier Perez de Cuellar, rose from his seat to introduce Mother Teresa to an elite gathering of the representatives of all member countries of the U.N. He needed only one sentence for his introduction: "I present to you the most powerful woman in



the world!" Hers was the power of humble, sacrificial, Christian service and agape love! She was the living proof of Jesus' words in today's Gospel—that real greatness lies in serving others. She served all with love and compassion.

Today's readings invite us to become great in the sight of God by doing God's will, as Jesus did, surrendering our lives in the service of others.

Jesus, in today's Gospel, gives us a glimpse of the path proposed by the 1st and 2nd readings; namely, loving Him in others by embracing the vulnerable in our midst: the defenseless children, the despairing poor, the terrified, the mentally ill, the marginalized, the disabled, the refugees of war. Jesus also teaches the apostles that child-like humility and loving, selfless service make one great in the eyes of God.

Iesus says that people who serve humbly and lovingly are the greatest. True greatness consists of loving service of one's fellow men, and it is never selfcentered. It lies in the ability to see and respond to the needs of others, and it presupposes compassion and sympathy. The two conditions of true greatness are humility and loving service. We are all supposed to be serving in love—whatever our position or role in society, the family, or the Church may bebecause true greatness lies in being the loving servant or slave of all.

We must become great through loving, humble, self-giving service. Greatness, in Jesus' view, is found in our willingness to accept, welcome, and serve with love those who are considered unacceptable and undeserving by reason of class, color, religion, poverty,

or culture. We must welcome people in the same loving way that a child would welcome them; i.e., before he or she is taught discrimination.

If we are going to be truly great, we must be ready to accept four challenges: 1) to put ourselves last, 2) to be the servant of all, 3) to receive the most insignificant human beings with love, and 4) to expect nothing in return.

By setting a child before them, Jesus asked His disciples to be like the child—loving, innocent, and humble, suggesting the importance of these virtues and attitudes. A child represents the most powerless member of any society; i.e., a person who has no power and no influence—a person who can be controlled, abused, neglected or spoiled and rendered selfish by others.

By introducing the example of a child, Jesus also shows us that, when serving others, we must be careful to serve the least important. This means that the Christian must show hospitality to those who have no social status: the outcast, the sinner, the sick, and the feeble. In other words, the Christian must serve all of God's children with love, regardless of whether they are friends or foes. Why? Because such people carry Jesus in our midst and, hence, they must be lovingly welcomed, respected and helped. In this passage, Jesus also tells us that we must care for the unwanted, neglected, abused, and ignored with love because then we really love and serve Jesus and His heavenly Father.

During the holy Mass, let us pray for the true spirit of service—for an attitude of love for those around us. We need to ask the Holy Spirit to help us to become truly great through loving, humble, and selfless service.

Mother Teresa puts it like this: "Be the living expression of God's kindness through humble service. Show kindness in your face, kindness in your eyes, kindness in your smile, and kindness in your warm greeting."

Monday, September 20th: Memorial of Sts. Andrew Kim Taegon, Priest, and Paul Chong Hasang, & Companions




Andrew Kim Taegon was born in 1881 into a Christian family. At 15 he went to China, where he was ordained a priest. He returned to Korea and was discovered, arrested, and then beheaded in 1846.

Paul Chong Hasang was a heroic Korean layperson. Born in 1795, he saw his father and brother die as martyrs. His family was deprived of all its possessions, and he shared their prison and persecution. Paul was beheaded for his faith in 1839. There were an additional 101 Korean Martyrs.

Tuesday. September 21st: Feast of St. Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist


Matthew was a Jew who worked for the Romans as a tax collector and, as such, was disliked by the population.

Jesus saw him while he was sitting in the customs house and called to him. Matthew gave up everything and followed. He wrote his Gospel during the 2nd half of the 1st Century, probably in Syria, where he went to evangelize the local population.



According to apocryphal sources, he died a martyr in Ethiopia.

Thursday, September 23rd: St. Pius of Pietrelcina, Priest



Francesco Forgione was born at Pietrelcina, northeast of Naples, in 1887. He became a Capuchin in 1903, choosing to call himself Pius (Fra Pio: he is now famous as Padre Pio).

Ordained a priest in 1910, in 1916 he was transferred to the convent of San Giovanni Rotondo, where he spent the rest of his life

He was active in caring for the needy and revealed gifts as a miracle worker. He received the stigmata in 1918, a sign of communion with the Passion of Christ. He died in 1968.
