

Today's Homily—26th Sunday of Ordinary Time—Year C

THE READINGS for today again represent the scriptural foundation of Catholic social teaching. Although Amos preaches to the Northern Kingdom of Israel regarding their impeding destruction, he also excoriates the Judeans in the South for



similar oppression of the poor. Amos' imagery casts the southerners' lifestyle as a luxurious one. Only the wealthy could afford comfort and leisure.

While the poor slept on dirt floors, the wealthy enjoyed beds of ivory. The wealthy softened their un -blotched skin with fine oils yet remained callous enough to ignore the lesson served from their northern neighbors. Amos' words about Judah came true a little more than a century later when Babylon invaded the land and exiled many of its inhabitants (around 586 BC).

The Gospel likewise warns us against becoming hardened by luxury in the face of poverty. Both the wealthy man and poor Lazarus die, yet the one accustomed to luxury goes into torment, while the one licked by dogs enters into comfort.

We are not told what, if any, explicit actions by the wealthy man warranted this judgment. But note that the poor man lay at his gate without enjoying even a scrap of the rich man's fare. Such treatment of the poor was forbidden.

The problem with the wealthy man was not his wealth but, rather, that he spent it all on himself while being oblivious to the poor man's plight before his eyes! This imbalance violates the spirit of the covenant; so, the rich man's fate agrees with the

teachings of the law and of the prophets. The wealthy man's concern to warn his brothers shows he understood that his neglect transgressed the command to love one's neighbor. This was no new teaching that Iesus gave to

His disciples; rather, He renewed the teaching of the Law of Moses and of prophets like Amos.

- ♦ How does the suffering of others affect us? The prophet Amos conveys a strong message from God: "Woe to the complacent!" (Amos 6:1a.) Sitting by while others suffer and doing nothing is not an acceptable way of being Christian. Yet, how easy it is to get wrapped up in our own families, jobs, and issues, only pausing to learn of another shooting or a detained migrant on the nightly news. Then, we move on.
- ♦ God does not expect us to fix every problem—we already have a Messiah for that. But God does hope our hearts will be stirred by the sufferings of our neighbors, enough that we will work actively toward a more just, loving, and inclusive world.
- Reflect with parishioners: Who is the Lazarus in your own community—someone who often gets pushed to the margins and disrespected? Spend some time with that person this week. Recognize the holy presence of Christ in front of you. Recall God's deep, abounding love for the least among us. Remember that God always takes the side of the hurting—and do the same.
