

Today's Homily

THE FIRST READING presents an unusual story from the Old Testament in which God heals the Syrian military man, Naaman. This Gentile trusted the Israelite prophet, Elisha, to heal his leprosy in the water of the river Jordan, and then he professed faith in the God of Israel.



While God gave Israel a special place of agency in his plan of salvation, that did not preclude His relationships with others. God created the entire universe. No people, custom, or earthly power can limit His love and mercy.

This story offers a scriptural precedent for Luke's theological perspective that Gentiles will have a covenant relationship with God along with Israel.

In Luke's earlier account of Jesus' rejection at Nazareth, the Lord had indicated His Father's inclusiveness by referring to the example of Naaman.

Later in the Gospel, Jesus heals a leper who is not a Jew—but a Samaritan. Samaritans were descendants of ancient Israelites who had intermarried with the Assyrians who invaded and destroyed the Northern Kingdom in the 8th Century BC. They were no longer considered part of God's people. Though they had adopted some Mosaic traditions, they did not worship at the Temple in Jerusalem. Thus they remained culturally and ritually separate. Violence was common between the neighboring peoples, and it was considered dangerous to travel through the other's territory. For a Samaritan to return to thank Jesus, a Jew, would have been a bold move.

The Samaritan leper and Naaman the Syrian exemplify Luke's theological outreach. Both are outsiders who show great fidelity to the God of Israel after a miracle touches them. These examples contrast with the Israelites who witnessed the exodus in Egypt but fell in the desert. The stories of the two outsiders also exemplify the scriptural tradition that God looks to reclaim all creation in a binding relationship.

- ◆ Jesus shows that returning can be a sacred act in today's Gospel. So often, we focus on the forward plans for next weekend, extra effort for a promotion, hopes for a future family life. There doesn't seem to be much value in looking back. But the thankful leper demonstrates how the acts of returning to past events and giving thanks build a strong foundation for the present and future. Returning enables us to move forward with greater confidence and purpose, trusting that the same God who came through for us before will grace us with compassion again.
- ◆ The leper not only faced a damaging health disease but was deemed ritually unclean and therefore ostracized from the community. There are too many modernday lepers who face exclusion and disrespect: people of color, immigrants, and women, just to name a few.
- ♦ With the Lord there is His mercy and the fullness of redemption for all His people. And who are we to say who His people are? In today's readings, we hear of divine healings extended to those outside of the commonly held boundary of God's people. As we celebrate this Eucharist, in which Christ gives Himself for the life of the world, let us call to mind those people we consider outsiders or less deserving, and ask ourselves how we might extend God's mercy to them.
