"God Leads a Pretty Sheltered Life" (Author Unknown)

t the end of time, billions of people were scattered on a great plain before God's Throne. Some of the groups near the front talked heatedly—not with cringing shame but with embittered belligerence.

"How can God judge us? And how can He know about suffering?" snapped a scoffing brunette. She jerked back a sleeve to reveal a tattooed number for a Nazi concentration camp. "We endured terror, beatings, torture, and death!"

Far out across the plain were hundreds of such groups. Each had a complaint against God for the evil sufferings He permitted in His world. How lucky God was to live in heaven where all was sweetness and light; where there was no weeping, no fear, no hunger, and no hatred.

Indeed, what did God even know about what men had been forced to endure in this world? "After all, God leads a pretty sheltered life," they said. So, each group sent out a leader, chosen because he had suffered the most.

There was a Jew, a Black, an "untouchable" from India, an "illegitimate," a person from Hiroshima, and one from a Siberian slave camp. In the center of the plain they consulted with each other. At last, they were ready to present their case. It was rather simple:

Before God would be qualified to be their judge, He must endure what they had endured.

Their decision was that God ". . . should be sentenced to live on earth—as a man!" But because He was

God, they set certain safeguards to make sure that He could not use His divine powers to help Himself. The conditions were the following:

- 1) Let Him be born a Jew.
- 2) Let the legitimacy of His birth be doubted.
- 3) Let Him champion a cause so just—but so radical—that it brings down upon Him the hatred, the condemnation, and the attacks of every major traditional religious authority.
- 4) Let Him try to describe what no man has ever seen, tasted, heard, or smelled.
- 5) Let Him try to communicate God to man.
- 6) Let Him be betrayed by His dearest friends.
- 7) Let Him be indicted on false charges and tried before a prejudiced jury and cowardly judge.
- 8) Let Him see what it is to be terribly alone and completely abandoned by every living thing.
- 9) Let Him be tortured and let Him die!
- 10) But let Him die the most humiliating death—as a common criminal—and with common thieves!

As each leader announced his portion of the sentence, loud murmurs of approval went up from the great throng of people. However, when the last had finished pronouncing His sentence, there was a long silence. No one moved. No one uttered another word.

Because suddenly they all knew—that God had already served His sentence—in Jesus!

Marriages


Couples need to make an appointment with Fr. Joseph 6 months before the proposed date.

Today's Homily

THE MORAL OF TODAY'S GOSPEL parable seems so blatantly unfair. The workers who put in a whole day's work and sweat receive the same wage as those who were there for only one hour? It makes us want to ask, "Jesus, what's going on here?"

But then we remember that envy and discontentment say everything about us, and nothing about what God is doing here. So, what is happening in this parable?

First, it's helpful to key in on Jesus' use of the phrase, *usual daily wage*. This was not a great sum by any stretch of the imagination, but subsistence money. It was just enough to live on.

All of the workers, then, needed that wage in order to supply their families with food for the day. Whether they were fortunate enough to get work first thing in the day or later in the day, the amount of money the hired workers had to earn in a day in order to survive did not change. The last group in today's parable must have thought that God answered their fervent prayers that someone, somewhere, would at least give them work before the day was through. They probably expected to receive only pennies for their labor. What a shock to get a "living wage" with which to return to their families!

The point then, it seems, is not about our sense of fairness or justice, but about the behavior of the landowner. He does not act like most owners. His

generosity is . . . well, scandalous. He offers a living wage to all who work for him—even the one-hour laborers.

The landowner understands what it takes for these workers to be able to subsist—to care for their families, to eat, to pay their taxes, and to have the self-respect and dignity of work.

When we understand that the landowner is representative of the kingdom of heaven, it starts to make sense. We get a glimpse of the Good Lord who offers salvation. It is salvation available to anyone who enters the vineyard at any time and is not diminished for one by its distribution to another. The Lord does not offer "partial" salvation, and it is certainly not salvation that we "deserve."

No, he offers the salvation that he knows we need and desire. We are recipients of the Lord's abundant mercy and generosity. His mercy is so outstanding that we can hope only to know, love, and serve Him all the days of our lives. And whenever someone wakes up to His offer, they are blessed.

We have no cause to be envious of the good fortune of another, for ours is equal in measure and justice. Rather, we can praise God for His continuous mercy to us. After all, serving in His kingdom is not drudgery; it is love and grace—all that we could ever hope for—all the days of our lives.
