
Marriages

Today's Homily

TODAY, WE GATHER here to reflect upon a passage from the Gospel of Matthew, specifically Matthew 25:1–13. In this parable, Jesus imparts a profound message that holds significance, not only in the context of the time when He spoke these words, but also for our lives today.

The parable of the ten virgins speaks of readiness, anticipation, and the importance of being prepared for the Lord's return. Let's dive into the key points of this passage.

First, Jesus tells us about ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. In this context, the bridegroom symbolizes Christ, and the virgins represent His followers—His Church. The lamps they carry symbolize the light of faith, and this tells us that all of us are called to shine the light of Christ in the world.

Now, what distinguishes the wise virgins from the foolish ones? It's their preparation. The wise virgins took oil in their vessels along with their lamps, while the foolish ones took their lamps but didn't take extra oil. This extra oil signifies our spiritual reserves—our relationship with God, our prayer life, and the depth of our faith. The wise virgins were prepared for the unexpected delays, but the foolish ones were not.

We often encounter unexpected delays and challenges in our lives. It could be personal struggles, crises, or even waiting for the fulfillment of God's promises. The wise virgins teach us the importance of being spiritually prepared for such times. It's a reminder for us to nurture our relationship with God daily through prayer, scripture, and acts of love and service.

But notice, the bridegroom was delayed, and they all slumbered and slept. This reminds us that waiting can be a difficult and tiring process. It's easy to grow complacent or discouraged in our faith journey when we don't see immediate results or when challenges



seem insurmountable. However, this parable encourages us to remain steadfast and keep our lamps burning. Then comes the pivotal moment: the cry at midnight, "Behold, the bridegroom is coming; go out to meet him!" This is a call to readiness and alertness. When the cry came, the foolish virgins realized their lamps were running out of oil, and they asked the wise virgins for some. However, the wise virgins wisely responded that they couldn't share their oil.

The oil of faith and spiritual preparedness is something each person must cultivate individually; it cannot be borrowed or acquired at the last minute.

This moment in the parable reflects the reality of judgment. When the day of the Lord comes, we will each stand before Him, and we cannot rely on someone else's faith to carry us through. We must have our own personal relationship with Christ.

The parable concludes with a warning: "Watch therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour." This is Jesus' call to us to be vigilant, to be watchful, to be ready at all times for His return. We don't know when that will be, but we should live each day as if it could be the day when He comes back.

In summary, the parable of the 10 virgins emphasizes the importance of spiritual preparedness, vigilance, and personal responsibility in our relationship with Christ. It reminds us that faith is not something we can borrow or take for granted; it's something we must nurture and cultivate daily. Let us be like the wise virgins—ready to meet our Lord whenever He comes—and let our lamps shine brightly in a world that so desperately needs His light.

May the Holy Spirit guide us in living out the wisdom of this parable, so that when the Bridegroom comes, we may be found faithful and prepared. In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.
