

## Today's Homily

HE READINGS
TODAY challenge
us to go courageously
beyond people's expectations by doing good
as Jesus did—instead
of brooding over all
the pain and suffering
in the world that we
cannot end.



The first reading details Job's attitude in a striking contrast: in the midst of his long suffering, Job speaks of the tedium and futility of life. Job's words describe the miseries of human existence. Eventually, Job arrived at a place in his life where, in trust and in Faith, he surrendered himself, his suffering, his work, and everything he had had and lost to the greater wisdom of God (Job 42:1-6).

**Today's Gospel** teaches us that true discipleship means getting involved in giving selfless service to others. Mark presents Jesus enthusiastically living out His first day of public ministry at Capernaum on a typical Sabbath day.

He shows us Jesus' ministry by taking part in the synagogue worship, teaching with authority, exorcising a demon, healing Simon's mother-in-law—and, after sundown, curing "many who were sick with various diseases, and [driving] out many demons"—a full day and evening of self-less ministry.

Thus, Jesus spent Himself and most of His time ministering to the needs of others, bringing healing, forgiveness, and a new beginning to many. Yet, Jesus was well aware that even the most important work had to be continually refueled and evaluated before God, His Father.

Hence, Jesus rose early the next morning and went off "to a deserted place" to pray in order to

assess His work for
His Father's glory and
to "recharge His spiritual batteries."

The first reading details Job's attitude in a that true discipleship means giving selfless, loviding contrast: in the midst of his long suffering service to others. We need to be instruments for Jesus' healing work.

Bringing *healing and wholeness* is Jesus' ministry even today. We all need healing for our minds, our memories, and our broken relationships, and now Jesus is also using counselors, doctors, friends, or even strangers in His healing ministry.

Let us ask for the ordinary healing we need in our own lives. When we are healed, let us not forget to thank Jesus for His goodness, mercy, and compassion by turning to serve others.

Our own healing process is completed only when we are ready to help others with their synagogue worship, teaching with authority, needs and to focus on things outside ourselves.

Let us also be instruments for Jesus' healing by visiting the sick and praying for their healing. But, let us remember that we need the Lord's strength—not only to make ourselves and others well—but to make us and others whole as well.

Jesus was a man for others, sharing what He had with others. In His life, He made time for prayer, time for healing, and for reconciliation.

Let us take up this challenge by sharing love, mercy, compassion, and forgiveness with others. Instead of considering life as dull and pointless, let us live our lives as Jesus did—full of dynamism and zeal for the glory of God.

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### **Shrove Tuesday Community Pancake Supper**



On Tuesday, February 13th, from 5 to 7 p.m., there will be a Pancake Supper held at the Prineville Presbyterian Church. There is no charge for this—but "Free-Will Offerings" are accepted—with all proceeds going to the Redemption House Ministries.

Shrove, derived from shrive, refers to the confession of sins as a preparation for Lent, a usual practice in Europe in the Middle Ages. Although the day is sometimes still used for self-examination and introspection, Shrove Tuesday eventually acquired the character of a festival in many places and is often celebrated with parades.

As the final day before the austerity of the Lenten fast, *Shrove Tuesday* also has many customs pertaining to food. Pancakes are traditional in a number of countries because eggs, sugar, and fat, commonly forbidden during the Lenten fast, are used up so they will not go to waste; the day is known as "Pancake Day" or "Pancake Tuesday" in Ireland and in many other countries.

- Ash Wednesday—the 1st day of Lent—is on February 14th. Masses are at 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- The Stations of the Cross—are every Friday Night at 6 p.m., starting February 16th to March 29th, with a Soup Supper to follow.
- Lenten Penance is on Wednesday, March 13th, beginning at 6 p.m.
- Thrism Mass in Baker City is on Thursday, March 21st, at 11 a.m.—Invitations are on the table in the narthex.
