

Today's Homily

s we gather on this third Sunday of Lent, we are invited to reflect on the theme of conversion—the turning of our hearts and minds toward God.

In today's Gospel, we hear the familiar story of Jesus cleansing the temple—a powerful symbol of his call to repentance and renewal.

The scene in the temple serves as a

stark reminder of the importance of authenticity in our relationship with God. Jesus overturns the tables of the money changers and drives out those who have turned His Father's house into a marketplace. In doing so, He challenges us to examine our own hearts and to root out anything that obstructs our communion with God.

Lent is a time for us to take stock of our lives to identify the areas in which we have fallen short of God's will and to make a conscious effort to change. It is a season of repentance and renewal, a time to turn away from sin and to turn toward God with sincerity and humility.

But true conversion is more than just a one-time event-it is an ongoing process of growth and transformation. It requires us to continually examine our lives in the light of God's truth and to make the necessary adjustments to align ourselves more closely with His will.

As we journey through Lent, let us be mindful of the ways in which God is calling us to conversion. Perhaps it is through acts of charity and compassion toward those in need. Or maybe it is through a renewed commitment to prayer and worship, allowing God to speak to us in the silence of our hearts.

Whatever form it may take, conversion requires courage and perseverance. It means stepping out of our comfort zones and trusting in God's grace to



guide us along the way. But the rewards of true conversion are immeasurable a deepening of our relationship with God, a sense of peace and fulfillment, and the promise of eternal life. May this Lenten season be a time of profound conversion for each of us—a time

of turning away from sin and turning toward God with open hearts and minds. And may we, like the merchants in the temple, be willing to let go of anything that hinders our relationship with God, so that we may experience the fullness of His love and mercy.

St. Paul reminds us that we are God's temples because the Spirit of God dwells in us. Hence, we have no right to desecrate God's temple by impurity and injustice. We are expected to cleanse our hearts of pride, hatred, jealousy and all evil thoughts, desires, and plans.

Reminiscent of what Jesus did in cleansing the Temple, we, as 21st Century disciples, must, with His grace, cleanse ourselves of attitudes and behaviors that prevent us from seeing and responding to hurt wherever we find it.

Let us welcome Jesus into our hearts and lives during Lent by repentance and the renewal of our lives. We will drive out the wild animals that do not belong to the holy temple of our body by making a whip of cords out of our fasting, penance, and almsgiving during Lent, and by going to Confession to receive God's loving forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Let us pray for the grace to embrace the call to conversion with courage and humility, trusting in the transforming power of God's love.
