Today's Homily

n today's Gospel, we Lencounter Jesus shortly after the miraculous feeding of the five thousand. The crowd, eager for more signs and wonders, follows Him across the Sea of Galilee. When they find Him, Jesus confronts them, saying, "You are looking for me not because you saw signs, but because you ate the loaves and were filled." He recognizes that their pursuit is driven by physical hunger and the desire for material satisfaction.

Jesus then redirects their focus, urging them, "Do not work for food that perishes,

but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you." Here, Jesus introduces a profound truth: while our physical needs are important, there is a deeper, spiritual hunger that only He can satisfy.

The crowd asks, "What can we do to accomplish the works of God?" Jesus responds, "This is the work of God, that you believe in the one He sent."

Faith in Jesus is the foundation of our spiritual nourishment. It is through believing in Him that we receive the true bread from heaven.

The people then demand a sign, referencing the manna their ancestors received in the desert. Jesus corrects them, explaining that it was not Moses, but God who provided the manna.

He declares, "The bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world."

At this point, Jesus makes a powerful statement: "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst."



Jesus Himself is the sustenance that fulfills our deepest desires and needs. He is the source of eternal life, offering Himself to us in the Eucharist.

As we reflect on this passage, we are invited to examine our own lives. What are we seeking? Are we focused solely on the material aspects of life—our jobs, possessions, and physical comfort? Or are we also attentive to our spiritual well-being?

In our modern world, it's easy to be consumed by the pursuit of material success and security. While these things are not inherently wrong, they can

never fully satisfy the deeper longings of our hearts. True fulfillment comes from a relationship with Jesus, who offers us the bread of life.

Let us also consider the Eucharist, the sacrament in which we receive Jesus, the true bread from heaven. In the Eucharist, we are united with Christ, and through Him, with one another. It is a profound mystery and a source of grace that sustains us on our spiritual journey.

As we approach the altar today, let us do so with faith and gratitude, recognizing the gift of Jesus, who nourishes and strengthens us. May we be transformed by His love and go forth to share that love with others.

In this week ahead, let us seek to prioritize our spiritual nourishment. Let us spend time in prayer, reflect on God's Word, and receive the sacraments with devotion. By doing so, we open ourselves to the grace and strength that only Jesus can provide.

May we always remember that Jesus is the bread of life. In Him, we find true satisfaction and the promise of eternal life. **Amen.**

August—The Month of the Immaculate Heart of Mary

St John Mary Vianney



This Sunday, August 4th, the Church celebrates the feast day of St. John Vianney, patron of priests

John Vianney, also known as the Holy Curé de Ars, was ordained a priest in 1815. He was sent to the remote French community of Ars in 1818 to be a parish priest. Upon his arrival, the priest

immediately began praying and working for the conversion of his parishioners.

Although he saw himself as unworthy of his mission as pastor, he allowed himself to be consumed by the love of God as he served the people. He gave powerful homilies on the mercy and love of God, and it is said that even staunch sinners were converted upon hearing him. In addition, he restored his church, formed an orphanage, "La Providence," and cared for the poor.

Firmly committed to the conversion of the people, he would spend up to 16 hours a day in the confessional.

Plagued by many trials and besieged by the devil, St. John Vianney remained firm in his faith and lived a life of devotion to God.

Dedicated to the Blessed Sacrament, he spent much time in prayer and practiced much mortification. He lived on little food and sleep, while working without rest in unfailing humility, gentleness, patience and cheerfulness, until he was well into his 70s.

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The Immaculate Heart of Mary

 Thursday, August 15th—a Holy Day of Obligation. Mass times are 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- ◆ The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary is on Thursday, August 22nd.
