

reth for their prejudice. But instead of getting discouraged, Jesus went with his disciples to the neighboring towns and villages, preaching and healing all who believe. Jesus then prepared the apostles to go serve as heralds to announce to the towns the Master would soon visit, bringing the Good News of the salvation. Today's Gospel repeats for us the instruction Jesus gave the apostles for their first mission.

Just as God sent the prophet Amos to preach repentance to ancient Israel and St. Paul to preach the Good News of salvation to the Gentiles, so Jesus sends forth his followers to proclaim the Good News of God's Kingdom and to bring healing to those who need it most.

Today's Gospel reports the instruction Jesus gave his disciples for their first mission. They should be walking illustrations of God's love and providence in action. They should preach repentance—a change of heart and a change of action taking people from a self-centered life to a God-centered life. They have to preach the "Good News" of repentance, forgiveness of sins, liberation and salvation through Jesus.

Each Christian is called not only to be a disciple but also to be an apostle. As disciples, we are to follow Jesus and imitate Jesus. As apostles, we are to evangelize the world. We are called to share with others not just words, or ideas, or doctrines but an experience, our experience of God and His Son, Jesus. Like the apostles, like St. Francis of Assisi, like St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa), we are all chosen and sent to proclaim the Gospel through our living.

It is through our transparent Christian lives that we must show in our own actions the love, mercy and concern of Jesus for the people around us. Since we are baptized, Jesus is calling us in our working and living environment to evangelize, to invite people to know Jesus, to love him, to serve him and to follow him. An important part of evangelism is the simple act of inviting a friend or family member to join us in worship. This is where reconciliation between persons and God

Although many people don't believe in real demonic possession in our day and age, there are many demons which can control the lives of people around us making them helpless slaves. For example, there are the demons of nicotine, alcohol, drugs and many other activities which somehow can take control of people's lives and become an addiction over which they have no control. All of these, or any one of them, can turn people into slaves. We need the help of Jesus to liberate us and others from these things. Jesus is inviting us today to cooperate with him. He wants us to be his instruments of liberation, to help others recover their freedom. We are meant to help people to cure their sicknesses—not only the bodily sicknesses but psychological and emotional illnesses as well. As a family member, a friend, a colleague, an evangelizer, when we work with Jesus, we can truly have a healing influence.

Realization of our dignity as children of God should change our outlook on life. We are to be children filled with love, rather than selfishness and disobedience. We are to respect our brothers and sisters in Christ. As God's children, we should live a life of absolute trust in the goodness of our Heavenly Father, who knows what is best for us. The realization that we are the children of God should bring us great comfort, peace and joy—even in our worst moments.

It is in the Church–principally through the seven Sacraments–that our Divine adoption is made possible. We are chosen by God in Christ, we are baptized into Christ's death and Christ's Church, or Mystical Body. We are healed by Jesus' forgiveness, and we are nourished at the Eucharistic table on Jesus' Body and Blood as our Food and Drink. Today, when we gather as His adopted sons and daughters at this table of Christ's sacrificial banquet, we can rightly address God as our Divine Father and ask Him for the special anointing of the Holy Spirit that we may grow daily in the true spirit and practice of our Divine adoption.

### **Our Lady of Guadalupe Silver Rose Story**

The Knights of Columbus will present the "Lady of Guadalupe Silver Rose" **after the 8 a.m. Mass on Monday, July 15th.** Please come and enjoy this celebration!

In 1960 a group of Knights of Columbus Squires from Monterrey Council in Mexico wanted to do something special in honor of Our Lady of Guadalupe. They invited the KC Squires from Laredo, TX, to London, Ontario, Canada, to join in running a "live rose" from Canada, across the U.S., and transfer it at the International Bridge in Texas.

After being blessed by **Bishop John Cody** in London, Ontario, in June of 1960, the rose started on its journey. The interest it created was high, so the Pilgrimage was done again in 1961 but, instead of a live rose, a "silver rose" made by a jeweler in Monterrey was used.

In 1990, **Supreme Knight Virgil C. Dechant** initiated this Silver Rose Pilgrimage as a Supreme Program.

In 2001, **Supreme Knight Carl Anderson** saw the Pilgrimage "as a perfect symbol that not only honored Our Lady of Guadalupe as Patroness of all the Americas but reaffirms the Order's dedication to the sanctity of human life from conception to natural death." What began in 1960 as a single route from Canada to Mexico evolved, and currently there are eight separate routes.

Our Silver Rose Pilgrimage began in Alaska, journeyed the British Columbia, Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Nevada, California, and is transferred at the International Border. It arrives with the other seven roses at the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Monterrey, Mexico, on December 12th, the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe.
