

Today's Homily



THE READINGS CHALLENGE us to consider our own responses to God's call and to reaffirm our commitment to living as disciples of Jesus.

In the first reading, Joshua gathers all the tribes of Israel and presents them with a choice: "If it is displeasing to you to serve the Lord, choose today whom you will serve." Joshua makes it clear that serving the Lord requires a deliberate decision. He leads by example, declaring, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."

This passage highlights the importance of making a clear and conscious decision to follow God. The Israelites had to decide whether they would continue to serve the Lord, who had led them out of slavery and into the Promised Land, or turn to the false gods of their ancestors or the surrounding nations.

The Gospel presents a pivotal moment in Jesus' ministry. After teaching about the Eucharist, many of Jesus' disciples struggle to accept His words: "This saying is hard; who can accept it?" As a result, many of His followers leave

Jesus then turns to the Twelve and asks, "Do you also want to leave?" Peter responds with a profound declaration of faith: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

This moment underscores the challenge of discipleship. Jesus' teaching was difficult for many to accept, and it required a deep level of trust and commitment. Peter's response highlights the essence of faith: even when we don't fully understand, we trust in Jesus because He alone has the words of eternal life.

The readings today are about choices. In the first reading, Joshua challenges the Israelites to choose whom they will serve. In the Gospel, Jesus presents His disciples with a choice: to stay with Him or to walk away. These choices are not just about saying yes or no to an idea; they are about committing our lives to something—or someone—greater than ourselves.

Joshua's call to the Israelites is a call to commitment. He asks them to reflect on all that God has done for them and to choose whether they will continue to follow the Lord. Similarly, Jesus' teaching on the Eucharist is a moment of truth for His disciples. Following Jesus is not easy, and His teachings sometimes challenge us in ways that make us uncomfortable. But like Peter, we are invited to recognize that there is nowhere else we can go to find the fullness of life that Jesus offers.

In our lives, we face similar choices. We may not be asked to choose between serving the Lord or false gods, but we are constantly faced with decisions about how we will live out our faith. Will we follow Jesus even when His teachings challenge our understanding or our way of life? Will we commit to living out our faith in our families, our workplaces, and our communities?

The second reading reminds us that our commitment to Christ is lived out in our relationships with others. Paul's instructions to husbands and wives to love and respect each other as Christ loves the Church challenges us to embody the love and sacrifice of Christ in our daily lives. Our choice to follow Jesus should be evident in the way we treat others, especially those closest to us.

Today, as we reflect on these readings, we are invited to renew our commitment to Christ. Like Joshua, we must declare, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Like Peter, we must recognize that Jesus alone has the words of eternal life, and there is no other path to true fulfillment.

Let us ask for the grace to choose Christ each day, to trust in His words, and to live out our commitment to Him in all that we do. And as we gather to receive the Eucharist, let us remember that this is the Bread of Life that sustains us on our journey, giving us the strength to remain faithful to the One who calls us to eternal life. May we always have the courage to say with Peter, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." *Amen.*
