# Fr. Joseph's Corner "Walking on Water"

Once there was a boy who lived with his family on a farm. They had a beautiful dog that would go down to the pond for hours every day in the spring and summer with the boy to practice retrieving various items. The boy wanted to prepare his dog for any scenario that may come up during duck season because he wanted his dog to be the best hunting dog in the whole county. The boy and his dog had vigorous training sessions every day until the dog was so obedient, he wouldn't do anything unless he was told to do so by the boy.

As duck season came around with the fall and winter months, the boy and his dog were eager to be at their regular spot down at the pond near their house. The boy slowly raised his gun and shot three times before killing a duck, which landed in the center of the pond. 



# **Today's Homily**

The readings for the 25th Sunday of Ordinary Time in Year B invite us to reflect on humility, service, and the human tendency toward ambition and competition. The theme centers on the call to true discipleship, grounded in humility and service to others.



In this Gospel passage, Jesus predicts His passion and death for the second time, but the disciples fail to grasp its meaning. Instead, they argue about who among them is the greatest. Jesus, aware of their conversation, brings a child into their midst and teaches them a profound lesson: "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all."

The child in this context symbolizes vulnerability, innocence, and lack of status. To welcome a child is to welcome the least, the one without power or influence. Jesus redefines greatness—not as the world sees it, in terms of power, wealth, or status—but as humble service to others, especially to the most vulnerable.

Jesus says that people who serve humbly and lovingly are the greatest. True greatness consists in loving service of one's fellow men and is never self-centered. It lies in the ability to see and respond to the needs of others, and it presupposes compassion and sympathy. The two conditions of true greatness are humility and loving service. We



are all supposed to be serving in love, whatever our position or role in society, the family or the Church may be, because true greatness lies in being the loving servant or slave of all. We must become great through loving, humble, self-giving service. Greatness, in Jesus' view, is

found in our willingness to accept, welcome, and serve with love those who are considered unacceptable and undeserving by reason of class, color, religion, poverty, or culture. We must welcome people in the loving way a child welcomes them before he is taught discrimination.

If we are to be truly great, we must be ready to accept four challenges: (a) to put ourselves last, (b) to be the servant of all, (c) to receive the most insignificant human beings with love, and (d) to expect nothing in return.

By setting a child before them, Jesus asked His disciples to be like the child—loving, innocent and humble—suggesting the importance of these virtues and attitudes. A child represents the most powerless member of any society, a person who has no power, no influence, a person who can be controlled, abused, neglected, or spoiled and rendered selfish by others. By introducing the example of a child, Jesus also shows us that, when serving others, we must be careful to serve the least important. This means that the Christian must show hospitality to those who have no social status: the outcast, the sinner, the sick, and the feeble. In other words, the Christian must serve all of God's children with love, regardless of whether they are friends or foes. Why? Because such people carry Jesus in our midst and, hence, they must be lovingly welcomed, respected, and helped.

In this passage, Jesus also tells us that we must care for the unwanted, neglected, abused, and ignored with love, because then we really love and serve Jesus and His heavenly Father.
