Today's Homily

THE READINGS FOR this Sunday invite us to reflect on the radical call to discipleship, the challenge of wealth, and the ultimate pursuit of eternal life in God's kingdom. We are asked to reconsider what holds value in our lives and what we might need to let go of in order to follow Christ fully.

In today's Gospel, we hear the story of the rich young man who comes to Jesus asking, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" He already lives a righteous life, keeping the commandments. However, when Jesus invites him to sell his possessions, give to the poor, and follow Him, the man walks away sad

because he is very wealthy. Jesus then says, "How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" And He compares this difficulty to a camel passing through the eye of a needle.

This Gospel can make us uncomfortable because it challenges the security that wealth and material possessions often bring. But it's not just about money—it's about our attachments. We may not all be wealthy like the young man, but we all have things in our lives that we cling to, whether they be material goods, status, control, or even relationships. These attachments can keep us from fully following Jesus.

Jesus is calling us to radical discipleship. He is asking us to examine our hearts and discern what prevents us from giving ourselves completely to God. The rich young man was a good and moral person, yet he was unable to take the final step of surrendering his wealth for the sake of the kingdom. His attachment to his possessions was stronger than his desire for eternal life.

Jesus' teaching on wealth is often misunderstood. He does not condemn wealth itself, but He warns about the way wealth can become a barrier between us and God. Possessions can easily take the place of God in our lives, leading us to trust in material security rather than in divine providence.

In our modern world, the pursuit of wealth and success is often prioritized. We live in a culture that encour-



ages accumulation, comfort, and security. But Jesus is inviting us to a different way of living—a life of radical trust in God, where we value relationships, love, and service above material gain.

When the disciples hear Jesus' teaching, they are astonished and ask, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus replies, "For human beings it is impossible, but not for God. All things are possible for God." This is a reminder that while the call to discipleship is demanding, it is not something we achieve on our own. It is by God's grace that we can respond to this call.

The rich young man walked away sad because he could not let go of his wealth. But Jesus'

invitation remains open to all of us. He is always calling us to deeper discipleship, to a life of freedom from attachments, and to trust in the promise of eternal life. If we find the call difficult, we must remember that we are not alone. God's grace will help us take the next step.

Jesus reassures His disciples that those who have left everything for His sake will receive a hundredfold now, in this life, and will inherit eternal life. This is not just about material blessings but about the deep joy, peace, and fulfillment that come from living a life in union with God.

When we are willing to surrender what we hold most dear, we open ourselves to receiving something infinitely greater—the treasure of eternal life and a deep relationship with God. This does not mean that following Jesus will be easy. Jesus promises that there will be persecutions and trials along the way, but He also promises His presence and the ultimate reward of eternal life.

Today's Gospel is a challenge to each of us. Jesus asks us, "What are you willing to give up to follow me?" It's not just about wealth; it's about anything that holds us back from fully committing to a life of discipleship. Let us pray for the wisdom to discern what we need to let go of and the courage to trust in God's grace.

As we journey through life, may we value wisdom, love, and service above all else, knowing that God is always faithful, and with Him, all things are possible.

Amen.
