Fr. Joseph's Corner

Dear Fr. Joseph,

Is it true that the Catholic Church allows cremation now, and if so, why? Thank you for taking the time to answer my question.

Dear Mary,

Thank you very much for the question. Yes, it is true that the Catholic Church allows cremation now, but the Church's preference has always been to bury the dead.

The ban on cremation was to oppose the pagan practices that were considered to be anti-Christian. The Romans did not believe in an afterlife. As such, they cremated their dead. The Christians of the early Church avoided cremation because of the connection with the Roman view. To be cremated served the purpose of denying the resurrection and afterlife.

Because Jesus was not cremated, this is another reason why this practice fell into disfavor with the Christians. And also because of the belief that the body is the home of the Holy Spirit, and it should be respected as such.

The Catholic Church's rejection of cremation was never intended to imply that someone who is cremated would never go to heaven. The Church has never opposed the cremation of Catholics after disasters such as a plague, or earthquakes or floods—when mass casualties occurred, making individual burials next to impossible.

The Church also permitted cremation in extraordinary situations where transporting a body half way around the world or a very great distance would have created extreme financial hardship.

In 1963, while continuing to maintain a strong preference toward burial, the Catholic Church became more open to allowing cremation. As more and more Catholics became aware of this change in the law, there has been an increase in the number of cremations among Catholics.

The current 1983 Code of Canon Law, states: "The Church earnestly recommends the pious custom of burial be retained; but it does not forbid cremation, unless this is chosen for reasons which are contrary to Christian teaching."

Prior to 1997, cremations had to take place after the funeral Mass so that the body could be present during the rite. Since then, the Vatican has granted permission to allow funeral Masses with the presence of just the ashes.

To this day, the Catholic Church Law forbids cremation when it is chosen for reasons that are contrary to Christian teaching. For example, if cremation is implemented for the purpose of denying the resurrection of the body.

Ashes are not to be scattered. You cannot decorate your living room with the ashes/urns of the dead. Nor can you keep the ashes in your basement, buried in your yard, or in the yard at your cottage.

The ashes of cremated Catholics are to be preserved afterward as a body would be preserved, either in a mausoleum or buried in a Catholic cemetery, which is holy grounds.

I hope this will explain your question.

Today's Homily

TODAY'S GOSPEL presents one of the most difficult teachings of Jesus: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. This is radical love that goes beyond human instinct, beyond fairness, and beyond justice as we usually understand it. It is a love



"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." If we are followers of Christ, we must strive to love as He loves. How Can We Live This Love? Loving our enemies may seem impossible, but with God's grace, it is possible. Here are some practical ways to live out this Gospel message:

that transforms hearts and reflects the mercy of God.

Our first reading gives us a powerful example of mercy in action. King Saul had been hunting David out of jealousy, seeking to kill him. But when David has the perfect opportunity to take Saul's life, he refuses. He spares his enemy, saying, "The Lord forbid that I should lay a hand on the Lord's anointed."

David shows us that mercy is not a sign of weakness but of great strength. He does not act out of vengeance but trusts in God's justice. His actions foreshadow the kind of mercy that Jesus would later teach.

In today's Gospel, Jesus takes mercy to an even higher level. He doesn't just say, "Don't take revenge." He tells us to love our enemies, to pray for those who hurt us, and to be generous even when it seems unreasonable.

This teaching is difficult because it goes against our natural instincts. We want fairness. We want to retaliate when we are wronged. But Jesus calls us to something greater: to break the cycle of hatred and revenge.

Why should we love in this radical way? Because this is how God loves us. Jesus says, "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." God does not treat us as our sins deserve. Instead, He forgives, blesses, and calls us back to Him.

We see this most clearly in Christ's sacrifice on the cross. As He was crucified, He prayed for His enemies:

- ◆ Forgive instead of holding grudges. Ask God for the grace to let go of bitterness.
- ◆ Pray for those who hurt you. It may not change them immediately, but it will change your heart.
- ◆ Do good without expecting anything in return. True love is selfless.
- ♦ Remember how much God has forgiven you. When we realize how much mercy we have received, it becomes easier to show mercy to others.

St. Paul reminds us in the second reading that we are made for something greater. We are called not just to live as earthly people, but as spiritual people, bearing the image of Christ. Our destiny is heaven, and the way to heaven is the way of love, forgiveness, and mercy.

Brothers and sisters, the challenge of today's Gospel is not easy, but it is the path to true peace and holiness. The world tells us to seek revenge and to hate our enemies, but Jesus calls us to a different way—the way of love.

As we approach the Eucharist today, let us ask the Lord for the strength to love as He loves, to forgive as He forgives, and to be merciful as He is merciful. Then, we will truly be children of our Heavenly Father.

May God bless us and help us to live this radical love. Amen.
