Today's Homily

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE
READINGS challenge us to discern God's call to each one of us to become His disciple with a mission. We are asked to recognize God's holy presence and acknowledge our unworthiness, due to our sinfulness, to become humble instruments in His hands, as the prophet Isaiah did in the

first reading, as St. Paul did in the second reading, and as St. Peter did in today's Gospel.

Today's readings also teach us that God has His own criteria for selecting people to be His disciples, ministers and prophets. Presenting the special calls—or vocations—of Isaiah, Paul, and Peter as life-changing events, the readings challenge us to examine our own personal change of life and commitment to our discipleship.

Isaiah, in the first reading, and Peter, in today's Gospel, express their unworthiness to be in the presence of God's great holiness, and Peter and Isaiah both immediately receive reassurance and their Divine calls.

God does not call the perfect; He perfects those He calls. Isaiah's story reminds us that God purifies and strengthens us for His mission, no matter how inadequate we feel.

Today's second reading describes the call of another great apostle, Paul, who judges himself to be unworthy of the name or the call, as he was a former persecutor of the Christians and the last apostle selected by the Risen Lord.

For, it was by giving these three men a strong conviction of their unworthiness and of their need for total dependence on His grace that God prepared them for their missions.

It was the miraculous catch of fish at Jesus' command, described in today's Gospel, that enabled Peter to find God in Jesus and prompted



him to surrender his life fully to Jesus' service as a full-time disciple. The Second Vatican Council teaches that we are all called to Christ's ministry by virtue of our Baptism into Jesus Christ.

We need to pray that our encounters with the holiness of God may lead us to recognize our sinfulness and accept His call. God, who calls us

and commissions us for His service, wants us to realize His presence everywhere and in everyone, to repent of our sins, and to remain in readiness to speak and act for Him in our life circumstances, as He shall direct us through His grace and His Holy Spirit.

We need to express our reverence for God through appropriate bodily gestures. For example, when we come into Church, we need to show reverence for Jesus' presence in the Tabernacle by making a deep bow or by genuflecting and blessing ourselves with the sign of the cross.

Then we need to honor Him by listening to the word of God and by actively participating in the liturgy's prayers and singing. This same sense of reverence can be expressed by keeping the Bible, God's living word to us, in a prominent place in our homes and by kissing it each time we read from it. True reverence for God naturally leads us to reverent, respectful love of our neighbors, as God dwells in them.

We need to remember that each of us has a unique mission in the Church. This is why God has a different call for each of us. Each of us is unique, so each of us has a mission which no one else can fulfill. Let us accomplish this mission as parents, priests, religious, and lay persons by radiating the love, mercy, and forgiveness of Jesus, and by participating in the various ministries of our parish.

February—The Month of the Holy Family

75th Jubilee Year

This year is St. Joseph Parish's **75th Jubilee Year.** As part of the year's celebration, we will look back at the previous decades,



starting with the 1950s and leading up to the "Jubilee Celebration" on Sunday, September 14th.

Our first church was located at 3rd St. and N. Court St., across from the Crook County Court House. The Parish was canonically recognized in 1943, appointing Father Thomas McTeigue as Pastor. Bishop Joseph F. McGrath was the Bishop of Baker Diocese when St. Joseph's celebrated the first Mass in Prineville. In the same year, the Parish purchased five city lots on 1st and Main—our current location. In 1946, the Parish held the first annual ham dinner. In 1950, the Knights of Columbus chapter was formed and named after Bishop McGrath. Also in 1950, Francis P. Leipzig was appointed Bishop of Baker.

The first Mass in our current location was celebrated on Palm Sunday in 1950. Bishop O' Brien dedicated the completed church and rectory in 1951. In the 1950s, Sunday Masses were celebrated at 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. There was an additional midnight Mass at Christmas. During deer season, there was a "Hunter's Mass" at 5 p.m. on Sunday.

In the 1950s, Mass was celebrated in Latin. The Altar faced the east wall, so the priest celebrated Mass with his back to the congregation. Altar servers were required to rapidly recite all responses in Latin. Bishop Liam Cary was an altar server in the 1950s, wearing the same cassocks we use today. To receive the Eucharist at the communion rail separating the Sanctuary from the Church, you were required to fast from midnight until receiving Communion. Since the entire Mass was in Latin, many parishioners recited the Rosary to themselves during Mass.

During the first two weeks of June, the Parish held a summer school at the former Crooked River Grade School. Classes were taught by visiting nuns. Prizes for good behavior and memorizing prayers came in the form of holy cards.

The annual Ham Dinner was held in the Church basement. All Parish religious education classes and meetings were also held in the basement.
