Today's Homily

THE 4TH SUNDAY OF EASTER is known as Good Shepherd Sunday. It is also the "World Day of Prayer for Vocations." Each year on this Sunday, we reflect on the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd who devotedly and kindly takes care of his flock.

The priest in charge of a parish is called pastor because pastor means shepherd of Christ's sheep. As a shepherd,

he leads, feeds, nurtures, comforts, corrects, and protects Christ's sheep in the parish.

Introducing himself as the good shepherd of his flock, Jesus makes three claims in today's gospel. I would like to share with you some of the qualities of this good shepherd, and the things he does for us.

- 1) He knows his sheep, and his sheep hear his voice: Just as the Palestinian shepherds knew each sheep of their flock by name, and the sheep knew their shepherd and his voice, even so Jesus knows each one of us, our needs, our merits and our faults. He loves us as we are, with all our limitations, and he expects us to receive and return his love by keeping his words. He speaks to us at every Mass, through the Bible, through our pastors, through our parents, family and friends, and through the events of our lives. "God whispers to us in our pleasures, he speaks to us in our consciences, and he SHOUTS to us in our pain!" (C. S. Lewis).
- 2) He gives eternal life to his sheep by receiv-ing us into his sheepfold through Baptism. He strengthens our faith by giving us his Holy Spirit in Confirmation. He supplies food for our souls by the Holy Eucharist and by the divine words of the holy Bible. He makes our society holy by the sacraments of matrimony and the priesthood.
- 3) He protects his sheep by placing them in the loving hands of his mighty Father. Without him to guide us



and protect us, we are easy prey for the spiritual wolves of this world: and includes Satan, as well as the seven deadly sins of pride, avarice, envy, gluttony, anger, lust and sloth.

He goes in search of stray lambs and heals the sick ones. Jesus heals the wounds of our souls by the sacrament of Reconciliation and strengthens us in illness and

old age by the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

4) Jesus dies for his sheep: Just as the shepherds of ancient days protected their sheep from wild animals and thieves by risking their own lives, so Jesus died in expiation for the sins of all people. What does Jesus want us to do?

Let us become good shepherds: Everyone who is entrusted with the care of others is a shepherd. Hence pastors, parents, teachers, doctors, nurses, government officials and politicians are all shepherds. We become good shepherds by loving those entrusted to us, praying for them, spending our time and talents for their welfare, and guarding them from physical and spiritual dangers.

Parents must be especially careful of their duties as shepherds by becoming role models for their children by leading exemplary lives. As sheep we are weak, often defenseless, and reliant on others. This would be incredibly bad news if we were being sent out into the world alone, or if we chose to try to it all on our own.

But we are never alone, because Jesus is our Good Shepherd. As sheep we are weak, but Jesus our Shepherd is strong. As sheep we are defenseless, but Jesus our Shepherd is our protection. As sheep we cannot succeed on our own, but Jesus is with us as the Good Shepherd to give us the guidance and strength to succeed in this life and reach the pastures of eternal life.

The 1980s

Bishop Thomas Connolly continued as Bishop through the '80s. Father Phelan continued as Pastor until mid-1982. Fr. Charles Dreisbach became Pastor in August of 1982 and stayed until June 1986. Fr. Gerald Condon came in June 1986 and left in June of 1989 and included a leave of absence to Ireland from June 1987 to December 1987. In July 1989, Fr. Robert Simard was appointed Pastor and stayed until 1999. He passed away in January 2002.

The diocese recognized two of our Parishioners, Helen Fagan and Kathleen Drewelow, with the Papal Medal Pro Ecclesia et Pontiface. Fr. Phelan was recognized as Monsignor in 1980. And in July 1980, a commercial dishwasher was installed in the Parish Hall. In March 1983, an elevator lift was installed to assist the elderly with access to the church. In February, a new organ was purchased and in 1982, the front steps had heaters installed in them. In March 1984, new tile roofs were installed on the Rectory and the Parish Hall, and that same vear, the sidewalks were repaired. In Spring 1985, the pews were refinished, and in August, Sr. Barbara Ann became the Religious Education Director and continued in that capacity until June 1988. In February 1986, the Sanctuary was painted and protective coverings were installed over the stained-glass windows. Also, new cabinets were installed in the Parish Hall. In 1987, a new Parish Directory was published., and in 1988, Parish Hall guidelines were approved by the Parish Council.

The Diocese DeSales Adult Education Program was initiated in 1981. Parishioners from 90-year-old **Annie Hendricks** to recent high school graduates participated. Retreats and Day of the Son celebrations were held, and our high school students enjoyed them.

In 1989, **John Solitz** established St. Vincent de Paul of Crook County and became its 1st President. It operated from the church basement with consent of the pastor and support of the Parishioners.
